## Managing The Broads

Damage to Broads can be caused by:

- Litter
- Water pollution
- Erosion caused by boat wash

#### **Habitats**

One of the most important habitats is the fens. It is made up of reed, sedge and marsh plants. To stop the fen drying out, the Boards authority:

- Hand cutting and rake marsh litter
- use fen harvester machinery
- Allow ponies and cattle to graze on the fen.

12th Century

Woodlands were cleared for fuel and building.

12th to 14th Century

Peat was extracted from the ground for fuel. Gradually, the holes created began to fill with water as the sea levels rose.
